

Geography Department



The Crystal trip - cable car

The Geography department have been involved in a wide range of fieldwork activities this half-term in KS3, KS4 and KS5. Year 12 students took part in a residential trip to Osmington Bay in September, to investigate sand dune succession along the Dorset coastline. The students were outstanding in the execution of the fieldwork techniques which they undertook and will now go on to use the data they collected to help with their exam questions. This half-term students will go on to participate in a human geography fieldwork activity in Rayleigh, which will allow them to make use of human geography techniques.

Our Year 13 students, also in September, made their way to a rainy Holkham in Norfolk, to help support them with collecting data for their individual investigation. This is the coursework section of the A2 exam and will make up 20% of their final exam mark. Students created a research question and undertook their own investigation by collecting data along the Norfolk coastline.

In addition to our A level trips, we have seen Year 9 visit The Crystal in London, a sustainable city exhibition which supported our pupils with investigating sustainable ways of living in an urban area. The trip also included a bird's eye view trip across the Thames on the Emirates cable cars. In addition to this, Year 11 pupils have been involved in a visit to Southend to collect data for their final exam in June.
