"As part of our Science Week celebrations, we welcomed back to Sweyne Park, popular and entertaining author John Townsend. (John has written over 200 books, both fiction and nonfiction, with many of them available in the school Library!). We also welcomed into school the whole of Year 5 from Glebe Primary School, as John kick-started the day with an entertaining talk in the hall. John then spoke with three Year 7 classes in the Library. The theme of the talks was *Amazing Animals* and the inspiration they give scientists to develop new ideas and technology.

John showed how the gecko has inspired scientists to create the "stickybot", inspired by the sticky pads that enable geckos to move up vertical walls and ceilings, and how this could be a useful tool. He discussed how echo location, which bats rely on, has been adapted to create a "smart cane" for blind people and that the saliva from vampire bats is being used in medicine as "Draculin" to help prevent blood clotting. There were many more scientific adaptations explored and all the audiences agreed that they enjoyed a lively and entertaining time. Michelle Waghorn

On 22nd February, Sweyne Park School welcomed two guest speakers from the Jack Petchey Foundation, who delivered four very creative workshops to 30 of our Year 10 students to help them improve their public speaking, but also with the aim of helping the pupils gain in confidence. Our two visitors taught the pupils about the importance of the content, structure and delivery of their speeches, as well as giving them advice on how to stand with confidence on stage. With the aid of a few drama-based games and activities, the pupils were hooked and fully engaged.

The workshops allowed the pupils to explore different topics for effective speeches. In the final session, every pupil was expected to give a small, one minute speech on their chosen topic. In that final session, despite some initial nerves, every single pupil performed their speech with confidence and it was amazing to see the transformation of these students into entertaining public speakers. Two pupils were selected as the most effective and entertaining speakers and these two pupils have been chosen to represent the school in the Regional Final of the Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge in May. We are all very proud of how these 30 pupils engaged with the workshops, and I personally had a very enjoyable day working with this group. We wish our two finalists lots of luck for the Regional Final. It is very exciting!
